Priority: Active community engagement

- Identify gaps in reach to potential applicants
- Analyze key differences in applicant and awardee profiles
- Assess niche of IMLS in its federal grantmaking role
- Understand the efficacy of grant funds within communities

Needs Assessment

- What are the community needs?
- How well do IMLS grants meet those needs?
- What does IMLS reach look like and what are the gaps?

Grantmaking Implementation

- How can IMLS improve its grantmaking, e.g. processes, technical support
- What are the barriers and challenges to applying
- How can IMLS improve communications about grant opportunities



Key Study Questions

Results Assessment

- What do the most successful projects look like
- How well do IMLS projects help the communities they are intended to service
- How can we better elevate lessons learned with others
