- 1 The building itself is awe inspiring. It's over powering.
- 2 The rotunda, the mosaics, the whole visual, architectural
- 3 experience of the facility is unbelievable. It's one of the
- 4 great public facilities oh, forget "public." It's one of
- 5 the great structures in the world. It's a magical building.
- 6 What it's meant to so many people. What it means to this
- 7 community. It has a real physical and emotional impact on
- 8 you just by virtue of what this structure is and how it
- 9 looks and how you experience it as an individual. My first
- 10 recollection of Union Terminal as a kid I remember my dad
- 11 bringing me down here and I must have been, I don't know,
- 12 probably eight years old, maybe seven and I was just in
- 13 so much awe of this huge place but really the dreams that
- 14 it inspired in me as a kid about all the places that you
- 15 could go to and riding a passenger train and going off to
- 16 the places that you'd never seen before was it was very,
- 17 very exciting. I always wanted to ride a train, but we
- 18 never, never did never did, never did. In 1972 I was 14
- 19 years old and Dad had just been named the director of
- 20 what was called the "Law in America Society." It was a new
- 21 national public interest center dealing with police-
- 22 juvenile relations. And so he was in Chicago for a month.
- 23 So my older brother and I each split two weeks in Chicago

- 1 with Dad while he was doing all this stuff. And we both
- 2 went to Chicago and back by riding a train and taking it
- 3 out of Union Terminal and finally I had this experience and
- 4 I was a passenger, getting on a train and when we returned
- 5 coming back into Cincinnati going along the tracks there
- 6 along the Ohio River and then on into Union Terminal and
- 7 coming out of the Rotunda and the skyline of the city in
- 8 the distance at night it the whole trip was magical.
- 9 And it was not only a great father-son experience that I
- 10 had with my dad, it was great in terms of really closing
- 11 the deal on all these dreams I had about Union Terminal and
- 12 train travel and that sort of thing. It really was a
- 13 magical experience and then just just two months after
- 14 that, my dad died. And so, for that reason I as well I
- 15 think that whole trip took on real larger-than-life
- 16 impression on me and it was truly one of the great
- 17 experiences that I've had in my life and Union Terminal was
- 18 at the center of it. My daughter, Emily, is as we speak -
- 19 ten years old and Emma has lived a life of some challenge.
- 20 She has Down syndrome and she is the embodiment of love and
- 21 joy and happiness. And it's a real joy in my life. And she
- 22 has grown up coming to Museum Center, taking part in
- 23 particular in the Children's Museum that she loves to go to

- 1 and all aspects of it from the water play and learning area
- 2 to the playground area where you climb through trees and up
- 3 into netting and tunnels and all sorts of things. She
- 4 absolutely loves that and she talks about Museum Center.
- 5 And at one point, I forget exactly what it was that I had
- 6 that I showed to Emma but she immediately recognized the
- 7 image of Museum Center and that's what she said. She said,
- 8 "Museum!" And we'll be driving to downtown and she'll have
- 9 her face glued to the window as we drive by where Union
- 10 Terminal is she's looking at that. She loves coming here.
- 11 It plays a real big role in Emma's life and in my life with
- 12 Emma. There were times when the building itself was looking
- 13 for the right fit and the right role to play in our
- 14 community. And people that cared a lot about the
- 15 architecture, the structure, were doing everything they
- 16 could in order to keep the building going until that "right
- 17 fit" was found. And so, "Was this the best place for a
- 18 shopping mall?" Clearly not. It certainly wasn't the right
- 19 fit for it long term. What it does today is. But why that
- 20 was important was because the people of Cincinnati,
- 21 Hamilton County, the greater Cincinnati region, know and
- 22 knew then and have always known I think how important it is
- 23 to keep this building going. And that to me is very

- 1 encouraging from the standpoint of when we look to the
- 2 future of what still can happen because I know that there
- 3 is real passion in our community for this building and for
- 4 what it represents and the asset that it is and what it
- 5 will do for greater Cincinnati. So much so that people
- 6 willing to allow it to be operated in a certain fashion
- 7 only because they knew that sometimes you've gotta build a
- 8 bridge to get from where you were to where you truly need
- 9 to be.
