Prison Libraries as Motivators of Pro-social Behavior and Successful Re-entry (PRISM prison library project)

Overview

Colorado State Library and Colorado Library Consortium, with partners RSL Research Group and Colorado Department of Corrections, request \$50,000 from IMLS to plan a statewide outcome-assessment of prison libraries. Currently, this sector has no extant efforts of this sort, such as the varied projects for public, school, and academic libraries (e.g., PLA Project Outcome; AASL C.L.A.S.S.; ARL's LibQual+, MINES, and LibValue). Colorado has 19 correctional institutions housing 13,962 offenders. The goal of this planning project is to determine how best to assess prison library contributions to offenders' development of pro-social behaviors that help them stay occupied productively and out of trouble while incarcerated and maximize their chances of successful re-entry into the community. Pro-social behaviors relevant to prison libraries include functional literacy, voluntary reading, library use, information-seeking and enquiry-based learning skills, digital literacy skills, and early and family literacy.

Need and Potential Impact

According to the International Centre for Prison Studies, the U.S. has the world's highest incarceration rate: 716 of every 100,000 population (https://preview.tinyurl.com/gqkavkw). According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the U.S. also has very high rates of recidivism—re-arrest, re-conviction or return to prison within three years of release: 67.8% overall, 56.7% within the first year (https://preview.tinyurl.com/zrrmmnc). Studies confirm that factors contributing to recidivism include age, gender, race, length and severity of criminal history, length of incarceration, education and skill levels, and conduct in prison (https://preview.tinyurl.com/jhn52qr). Evidence-based practices proven to reduce recidivism by encouraging more pro-social behaviors include "re-wiring the brain, increasing positive reinforcement, and ongoing support" (https://preview.tinyurl.com/gocwa9w). Offenders who exhibit more pro-social behaviors tend to have better self-esteem and less social anxiety, and are more likely to participate in social interaction, engage in conversations and discussions, collaborate with others to achieve a goal, and express informed opinions. Prison libraries do many things that have a potential impact on developing and sustaining pro-social behaviors. These include enabling their users to access popular reading materials and information to support re-entry; and engage in independent learning and family literacy, and formal education and treatment programs (https://preview.tinyurl.com/y7syjuvj, https://preview.tinyurl.com/y8eu4x2d). Isolated and largely anecdotal evidence indicates that use of prison libraries by offenders helps reduce recidivism (e.g., https://preview.tinyurl.com/yamhg73s, https://preview.tinyurl.com/yc8gqsol, https://preview.tinyurl.com/y7tb5jjd, https://preview.tinyurl.com/y79jxj7a). Also, partnerships between prison and public libraries in particular are believed to contribute to successful re-entry and reduced recidivism (https://preview.tinyurl.com/aeh23n6, https://preview.tinyurl.com/y7zz7399).

Because U.S. incarceration and recidivism rates are so high and since there is promising evidence that prison libraries may play a significant role in promoting pro-social behaviors that contribute to successful re-entry and reduced recidivism, it is time for a large-scale study to assess these potential contributions. Because Colorado champions rehabilitation over punishment, it is an excellent state to model a first-of-its-kind study that can be replicated nationwide. Ordinarily, assessments of library outcomes and impact are fairly straightforward; however, in the correctional environment, there are complexities that necessitate a period of substantial planning for such a study to be conducted successfully. Owing to security and privacy policies, scheduling practices, and other varying institutional factors, these complexities include:

- building partnerships with prisons and their local library, education, and social services agencies;
- identifying and establishing working rapport with key stakeholders within these organizations; and
- testing potential methodologies and data collection instruments for use with offenders, librarians, and other stakeholders who work with them.

Relevance to the Community Anchors Project Category

Prison libraries offer a bridge to offenders, both helping them to make constructive use of their time while incarcerated and preparing them for release back into the community, where they are served by community libraries. Prison libraries encourage offenders to participate in civic and cultural engagement, community dialogue, early learning, lifelong learning, and digital inclusion. Libraries also enable them to achieve enhanced equity and access to information and services and economic viability. The PRISM planning project for a prison library impact study will engage researchers, practitioners, and policy-makers. Together they will develop a responsive and replicable research design that will include mining existing data and vetting the best methodologies for involving correctional stakeholders, prison librarians, and library users in developing new service outcome indicators. These new indicators will be designed for widespread implementation and easy adoption by U.S. correctional libraries, thus enabling replication and expansion of this new line of research. PRISM data and research will contribute to improving the effectiveness of prison libraries in serving offenders during their incarceration and preparing them for successful re-entry into the community.

Projected Performance Goals and Outcomes

An advisory committee composed of project staff and stakeholders will finalize the goals and objectives of this PRISM planning project as well as the envisioned study. The goal of that study is to illuminate for correctional decision-makers the contributions of prison libraries to managing offender behavior while incarcerated and to preparing them for re-entry into the community. Desired outcomes of this planning project are to satisfy stakeholders that:

- the research design will generate high-quality, actionable data about the contributions of prison libraries;
- the study design and work plan are sufficient for the findings to inform them about library contributions to offender behavior management and re-entry preparation; and
- they are prepared for their participation in this planning project and the planned study.

Proposed Work Plan

This PRISM planning project will lay a foundation for the model Colorado study by:

- developing partnerships and working agreements with correctional, library, education, and social services agencies;
- conducting exploratory research including reviews of relevant literature and research in progress as well as key informant and/or focus group interviews of offenders, correctional officials, and stakeholder representatives; and
- formulating a research design and work plan for a pilot study that addresses the above goals and objectives of research to fill this conspicuous gap in the library literature.

Project Director and Partners

Diane Walden, Institutional Library Development Coordinator, Colorado State Library, will serve as project director. Keith Curry Lance, Ph.D., Consultant, RSL Research Group, will serve as principal investigator, assisted by other RSL researchers. Walden and the RSL team are nationally recognized leaders in the institutional library and library research communities, respectively. Representatives will be recruited from Colorado prisons—including librarians, administrators, analysts, and others—and other stakeholders.

Estimated Budget

Of the total \$50,000 budget, \$45,000 is designated for a contract with RSL Research Group, \$3,000 for expenses associated with partnership-building meetings and travel, \$1,000 for documents or document access and miscellaneous expenses (planning report printing and postage), and \$1,000 for indirect costs.
