The ninth annual IMLS WebWise Conference on Libraries and Museums in the Digital World has as its theme *WebWise 2.0: The Power of Community*.

The partnership with The Wolfsonian is a response to earlier participant suggestions to hold the conference in different regions of the country in order to give more people an opportunity to attend, and we are pleased that this has in fact happened.
