In this presentation, we'll be addressing the following topics:

First, we'll consider the IMLS vision, mission, and strategic plan. These are important to you as a potential applicant for funding because they inform our grant-making. Becoming familiar with them will help you understand why our grant programs are structured the way they are and why we ask you as an applicant to address certain issues in your application.

Second, we'll present basic information about our funding programs and opportunities. This is to help you decide which of our programs is best suited for your project. We'll begin with two technical assistance programs, the Museum Assessment Program or MAP, and Collections Assessment for Preservation or CAP.

We'll then move to our four grant programs: Museums for America, National Leadership Grants for Museums, Museum Grants for African American History and Culture, and Native American/Native Hawaiian Museum Services Grants. We'll also identify topics of special interest to IMLS this year as defined by strategic initiatives and by opportunities to leverage investments that IMLS has made over the past several years.

Third, we'll address determining your institution's eligibility to apply for specific grants. There are different requirements for each program, and it is very important to consult the notice of funding opportunity for details, but the information we provide today should help you make good preliminary decisions about which to pursue.

Fourth, we'll show you where to find information online, focusing on the IMLS website.

Fifth, we'll talk about the three places you must be registered in order to apply for a grant and stress how important it is to do this work well in advance of the grant deadline.

And finally, we'll share our contact information and the dates and times for the program-specific webinars scheduled in October, all of which will help you learn more.

IMLS Vision and Mission

When you consider the details of each of our funding programs, we think you'll see these two simple but powerful messages well represented.

IMLS Strategic Plan

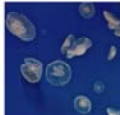
Three programmatic strategic goals drive IMLS grant-making.



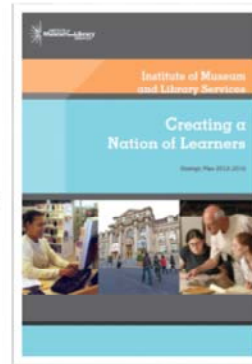
Learning Experiences: IMLS places the learner at the center and supports engaging experiences in libraries and museums that prepare people to be full participants in their local communities and our global society.



Community Anchors: IMLS promotes museums and libraries as strong community anchors that enhance civic engagement, cultural opportunities, and economic vitality.



Collections Stewardship: IMLS supports exemplary stewardship of museum and library collections and promotes the use of technology to facilitate discovery of knowledge and cultural heritage.



Much like your own institution’s strategic plan, ours identifies goals that help us achieve our vision and accomplish our mission. There are three programmatic goals that drive our grant-making. We require all applicants to align their projects with one of these goals. This is one of the most important decisions you will make about your grant proposal, so take the time to choose carefully.

Goal 1, abbreviated as “Learning Experiences,” makes it clear that IMLS places the learner at the center and supports engaging experiences in libraries and museums that prepare people to be full participants in their local communities and our global society.

Goal 2, “Community Anchors,” specifies that IMLS promotes museums and libraries as strong community anchors that enhance civic engagement, cultural opportunities, and economic vitality.

And Goal 3, “Collections Stewardship,” confirms that IMLS supports exemplary stewardship of museum and library collections and promotes the use of technology to facilitate discovery of knowledge and cultural heritage.

Technical Assistance Programs for Museums

Museum Assessment Program

Program Goal: To help small and mid-sized museums of all types strengthen operations, plan for the future, and meet national standards.

Assessments: Organizational; Collections Stewardship; and Community Engagement

Deadlines: December 1, 2016 and July 1, 2017

Let's turn now to the two technical assistance programs for museums. These are different from grant programs in the way they are structured and in the way you apply for them.

The Museum Assessment Program, or MAP, helps small and mid-sized museums strengthen operations, plan for the future, and meet national standards. It involves one year of self-assessment, institutional activities, and consulting peer review. MAP offers three different customizable assessments that you may wish to consider: Organizational Assessment, Collections Stewardship Assessment, and Community Engagement Assessment.

The program is administered by the American Alliance of Museums, and there are two deadlines each year. At this time, the most immediate deadline is December 1, 2016 with another opportunity coming July 1, 2017. For more information, we recommend that you visit AAM's web page listed here.

Technical Assistance Programs for Museums

Collections Assessment for Preservation

Program Goal: To support collections assessments for small and medium-sized museums to improve collections care, conservation, and preservation

Deadline: Early 2017

Administered by: Foundation of the American Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works

The Collections Assessment for Preservation (CAP) Program is a new technical assistance program that provides partial funding toward a general conservation assessment for small or mid-sized institutions. The assessment covers all of the institution's collections, buildings, and building systems, as well as its policies and procedures relating to collections care.

The finished product is a complete assessment report with prioritized recommendations to improve collections care, which provides recommendations and priorities for collections preservation action; facilitates the development of a long-range preservation plan; and serves as a fundraising tool for future collections projects.

The CAP program is administered by the Foundation of the American Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works. FAIC staff are currently working with IMLS and a steering committee to develop policies and procedures for this new program. We expect to open applications in the late fall of 2016 with applications due in early 2017. Information will be posted on the web page listed here.

Now, let's take a look at the four IMLS museum grant programs.

Museums for America, or MFA, is our largest grant program, receiving the largest number of applications each year and the one in which we make the largest number of awards. The overall goal of the program is to support activities that strengthen the abilities of museums to serve its public. As an applicant, you must align your project with one of our programmatic strategic plan goals by choosing a project category. Your options are Learning Experiences, Community Anchors, and Collections Stewardship.

The deadline for FY2017 applications is December 1, 2016. Grant requests may range from \$5,000 to \$500,000 for projects scheduled to last from 1 to 3 years. Please note that the upper limit of \$500,000 is new this year and represents a significant increase over the previous cap of \$150,000.

There are two funding levels in MFA, and each has its own cost share requirement. For projects requesting \$5,000-\$25,000, no cost share is permitted. For projects requesting \$25,001-\$500,000, a 1:1 cost share is required, meaning that for every dollar requested from IMLS, you must provide at least one dollar in staff or volunteer time, cash, or third-party in kind.

We highly recommend participating in the MFA webinar, scheduled for October 14, 2016 at 3:00 pm Eastern Time, and talking with an IMLS staff member to learn more about MFA, the kinds of projects it supports, its funding levels, and cost share requirements.

National Leadership Grants for Museums support projects that address critical needs of the museum field and have the potential to advance practice in the profession so that museums can improve services for the American public. As an applicant, you must align your project with one of our programmatic strategic plan goals by choosing a project category. Your options are Learning Experiences, Community Anchors, and Collections Stewardship.

The deadline for FY2017 applications is December 1, 2016.

There are now three funding levels in National Leadership Grants for Museums, and each has its own duration and cost share requirement. Rapid Prototyping Projects may range from \$5,000 to \$50,000, should be completed within one year, and require no cost share. Through this funding level, IMLS welcomes applications that may previously have been submitted to the Sparks! Ignition Grants for Museums program, which no longer exists as a standalone funding opportunity.

Research Project requests may range from \$50,000 to \$1 million for 1 to 3 years and require no cost share. Please note that the upper limit of \$1,000,000 is new this year and represents a significant increase over the most recent cap of \$500,000.

Non-research Project requests may range from \$50,000 to \$1 million for 1 to 3 years, and require a 1:1 cost share, meaning that for every dollar requested from IMLS, you must provide at least one dollar in staff or volunteer time, cash, or third-party in kind.

The goal of Museum Grants for African American History and Culture is to improve the operations, care of collections, and development of professional management at African American museums.

The deadline for FY2017 applications is December 1, 2016. Grant requests may range from \$5,000 to \$500,000 for projects scheduled to last from 1 to 3 years.

There are two funding levels in AAHC and each has its own cost share requirement. For projects requesting \$5,000-\$25,000, no cost share is permitted. For projects requesting \$25,001-\$150,000, a 1:1 cost share is required, meaning that for every dollar requested from IMLS, you must provide at least one dollar in staff or volunteer time, cash, or third-party in kind.

The goal of Native American/Native Hawaiian Museum Services Program is to enhance museum services in order to sustain heritage, culture, and knowledge among Indian tribes and organizations serving Native Hawaiians.

The deadline for FY2017 applications is December 1, 2016. Grant requests may range from \$5,000 to \$50,000 for projects scheduled to last from 1 to 2 years, and no cost share is required.

The NANH webinar is scheduled for October 6, 2016 at 3:00 pm Eastern Time. Please consider participating in it as well as talking with an IMLS staff member to learn more about this program and the types of projects it supports.

Some of the eligibility requirements for IMLS grant programs are similar, and some vary among programs as summarized on the next two slides. While we hope this will give you enough information to get started on deciding which program is best for you, we encourage you to consult the specific notice of funding opportunity for any program in which you are interested in applying for more detail.

For three of our four grant programs—Museums for America, National Leadership Grants for Museums, and Museum Grants for African American History and Culture—your organization must be either a unit of state or local government, or a private nonprofit organization that has tax-exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code.

In addition, for the same three programs, your organization must be located in one of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin Islands, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, or the Republic of Palau.

For Museums for America, your organization must qualify as a “museum.” This means you must use a professional staff; you must be organized on a permanent basis for essentially educational or aesthetic purposes; you must own or use tangible objects, either animate or inanimate; you must care for these objects; and you must exhibit these objects to the

general public on a regular basis through facilities that you own or operate. Alternatively, and reflecting a different governance structure, your organization may be eligible if you are a public or private nonprofit agency that is responsible for the operation of a museum that fits these criteria.

You'll see that there are Xs in parentheses under National Leadership Grants for Museums and Museum Grants for African American History and Culture. Applicants to these programs are eligible to apply if they meet these criteria as a museum, but there are additional options and requirements for these two programs.

If your organization is one that engages in activities designed to advance the well-being of museums and the museum profession, OR is an institution of higher education, including public and nonprofit universities, then you are also eligible to apply for National Leadership Grants for Museums.

To be eligible to apply for Museum Grants for African American History and Culture, your organization must be a museum as defined on the previous slide AND your primary purpose, as reflected in your mission, must be African American life, art, history, and/or culture. Alternatively, you may be:

- A museum service organization or association whose primary purpose is to support museums devoted to African American life, art, history, and/or culture, OR
- An Historically Black College or University.

To be eligible to apply for a Native American/Native Hawaiian Museum Services Program grant, you must be a federally recognized Indian tribe, an Alaskan Native village or corporation, or an organization that primarily services and represents Native Hawaiians.

Once again, because the details of eligibility vary in detail, we strongly encourage you to consult the specific notice of funding opportunity for any program to which you are interested in applying and to call an IMLS staff member to discuss your particular situation

at the beginning of the process of crafting an application.

Determining Eligibility

You are *not* eligible to apply if you are:

- A federally funded institution
- A for-profit organization
- An individual
- A foreign country or organization

For all IMLS museum grant programs, your organization is not eligible to apply if you are a federally funded institution, a for-profit organization, an individual, or a foreign country or organization.

However, and this is important, even if you are a non-eligible institution, you could participate in a grant-funded project by partnering with an eligible institution. Once again, if you have questions about this, please contact an IMLS staff member to discuss it further.



To find more information to help you create a competitive proposal, your first stop should be our website—www.imls.gov.

From our home page, you'll be able to search for available grants by name or keywords; access the actual Notices of Funding Opportunities, download sample applications, and search our database of previously awarded grants.

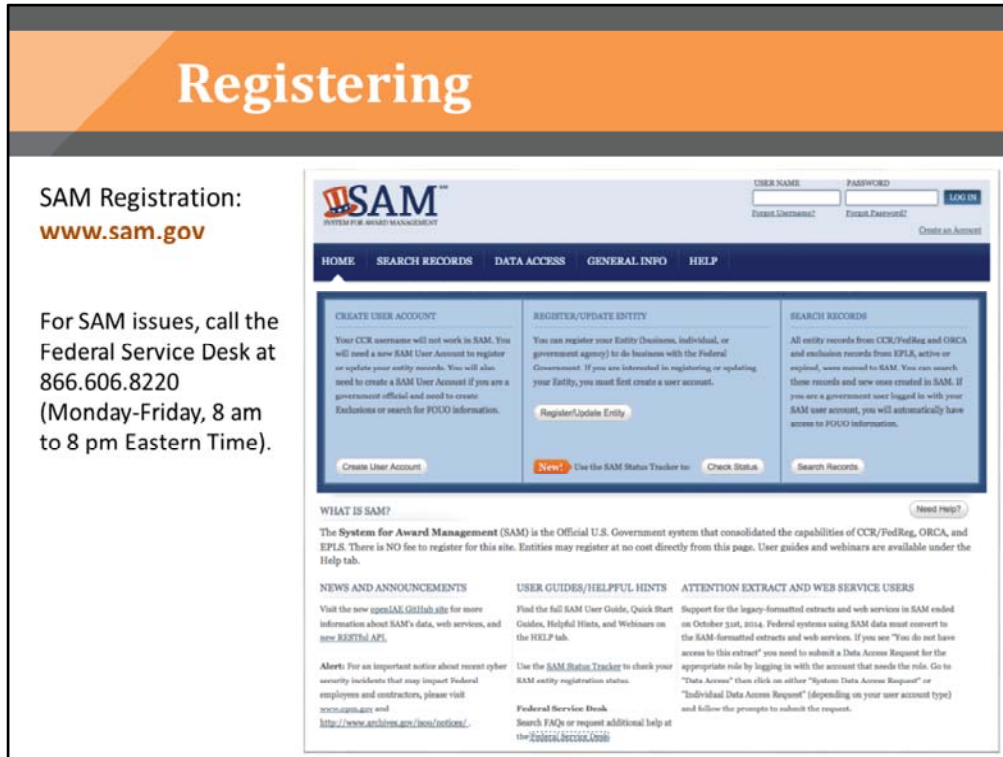


For each grant program, the Notice of Funding Opportunity provides detailed instructions, access to required forms, and links to helpful resources designed to assist you in developing your application.



At this juncture, we want to draw your attention to three registration requirements—DUNS, SAM.gov, and Grants.gov. Your registrations must be complete and up to date in order for you to submit an application or receive an award. If you’re starting from scratch, it’s important to know that you must complete these registrations in sequence.

First, you must have a DUNS number. Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) provides this unique nine-digit identification number FREE for all businesses required to register with the Federal government for contracts or grants. If you have a DUNS number, be sure you know it. If you don’t have one, then visit www.dnb.com to learn how to get one.



Second is SAM—which stands for System for Award Management.

Registering with SAM is also FREE. It can be time consuming, and it is different from DUNS in that you must renew your registration each year to make it ACTIVE. Because SAM.gov registrations vary in their expiration dates, check your status early on and take action to ensure you are registered and your registration is ACTIVE.

Begin with the website, and use the FAQs to research questions. If you have further SAM issues, call the Federal Service Desk at 866-606-8220, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Eastern Time).

The third place you must be registered is Grants.gov, the portal through which all applications for IMLS grants must be submitted. To register, you must have an active SAM.gov status, and of course, a DUNS number. The Grants.gov website is extensive, and their help capabilities are numerous and well-staffed. Begin with the website and its FAQs, but if you need additional help you may call their help line at 80-518-4726, which is available 24/7, or email them at support@grants.gov.

Summary

Third, each grant program has its own set of eligibility requirements, and you should consider these early on in the process of selecting a grant program.

Fourth, helpful information, contacts, and notices of funding opportunities are on the IMLS website, www.imls.gov.

Fifth, it is very important to get a DUNS number and to register early with SAM.gov and Grants.gov.

And lastly, be sure to participate in the webinars for each program to which you may apply. You'll have the chance to ask questions and to listen to those posed by others.

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In closing, here are ways to learn more about IMLS funding programs.
